From the PCO President

During a recent visit to the Pullman Club Coffee Shop, an exhibit titled "Pullman Preservation Pioneer" caught my eye. The exhibit showcases the role John Edward Ertsman played in preserving our community through a series of framed correspondences from the 1960s. Not knowing this history, I had to learn more.

John Ertsman was a longtime Pullman resident credited as the progenitor of harnessing historic preservation with the survival and sustainability of our community. As this idea spread, the president of the Pullman Civic Organization formed the Beman Committee in 1968. Named after the architect who planned Pullman, Solon S. Beman, the incipient purpose of the committee was "to preserve the historic and residential character of Pullman so that it would satisfy today's needs without destroying yesterday's heritage or jeopardizing tomorrow's future."

The following quotes are excerpts taken from the "Pullman Preservation Pioneer" exhibit and highlight the initial push to preserve our neighborhood.


Donald O'Toole, President of the Pullman Banking Group, wrote to John Ertsman on December 3, 1963: "Last Saturday evening I picked up your interview on the television. You made me feel really proud of our Town of Pullman, of its great historical background, and of the tragedy that would be if it were not carefully preserved."

Ertsman replied to O'Toole on June 25, 1964: "I don't know what reaction our South End Chamber of Commerce would have on any proposal for concerted furthering of the Pullman project—perhaps the area looks too enticing for industrial purposes. On the other hand, interest and action by the National Park Service, or other competent authority, could give invaluable publicity to our community and provide a 'must' for visitors to Chicago. Who knows, one day there may be a museum depicting the origin and development of sleeping cars in the Pullman area?"

Ira J. Bach, Commissioner of City Planning, wrote to Donald O'Toole on July 9, 1964: "I do feel, however, that if a number of individuals strongly believe the old Pullman area deserves to be preserved, they should investigate the means of financing and carrying out such a program. Many successful preservation projects have their beginnings in the efforts of a small group of people."

Starting with a small group of people like John Ertsman, Pullman received local, state, and national designations starting in 1968, achieving the status of a National Historical Park in 2022. The success of preserving Pullman can be largely attributed to the paradigm of a community focused on its own collective efforts rather than those of outside interests paired with the pride fostered by the historical significance of residents' homes and neighborhood.

Since 1960, the PCO gathers, supports, and informs our community. Together, we can!

The Pullman Flyer

From the Dining Car Astrid Fingerhut

Happy New Year! It's cold and it's dark, but it's getting lighter every day... and summer is coming! In anticipation of that, our neighbor Desiree Kiss agreed to share her delicious dandelion dip, which even though I never had anything like this till Desiree introduced me, tastes like the memory of fresh cut grass and morning birdsong. Enjoy!

Fresh dandelion greens (please do not pull these out of the yard). 4 bunches, each equivalent to a bunch of parsley.

Tahini - ground sesame seed sauce. Roughly 1 cup

Olive oil - for sauteing onions your choice how much (we prefer a little extra)

Large onion, diced

Salt to taste

Large lemon - we like a LOT of lemon so again, to taste. Start with 1/2 of a lemon squeezed, taste and add or don't.

Garlic - I used 4 cloves (we like a LOT of garlic)

Water - I probably used 1/2 cup

Clean and chop the dandelion greens into roughly 1/4" pieces.

Barely cover the greens with water in a large pot. Add salt (a pinch). Cover and bring it to a boil, then turn it down to a simmer and leave it covered. Your goal is to "boil down" the greens so they're squishy. This will take 30 minutes at least--just stir occasionally and see if they're soft/ squishy or still "hard" leaves.

While the dandelion is simmering, dice an onion (if you prefer less onion, use less).

Saute the onions in olive oil. We like them WELL DONE some even burnt—cook to your preference.

Pour 1 cup of tahini into a bowl. Squeeze the lemon and add that. Mix the tahini and lemon - it will get THICK like a heavy dough, that's when you add water, a little bit at a time and mix it until it becomes creamy again. Add the garlic and salt (to taste). Stick your finger in and taste it - do you want more salt/ lemon or garlic? Now is when you add it. You DO NOT WANT IT RUNNY. It should be creamy like a ranch salad dressing. If you add too much water, add more tahini and lemon to thicken it. Set aside.

Once the onions are sauteed, turn the heat off and let them chill in the pan.

Once the dandelion is soft, strain it. I use a metal mesh strainer. Once it's in the strainer, SQUEEZE out excess water by "mashing" it against the strainer with a spoon. It will mush into a ball of soft squishy mess. That's what you want. If you don't squeeze it enough, your sauce will taste "watery" so make sure you squeeze as much water out as possible.

Dump the mushy dandelions into the tahini sauce, dump the onions in. Take a whisk and mix it together so the dandelion blends with the tahini sauce and onions. Taste it - do you need more salt/ lemon/ garlic, etc? you can still add it at this point.


We usually eat at least 1/3 of it right then and there. It actually is better the NEXT day when the flavors have kind of "melded" better.
